Member Training Update

For those members who need or want the new TCT (Team Coordination Training) refresher course, take it in Orlando at either NACON on August 24 at 1300 or DTRAIN tentatively scheduled on September 22 at 0800. Either class will require you to pay to register for that conference and go to Orlando.

The course is required for some members but any member who has thoughts of working for the Marine Safety Office (MSO), getting into any operations area such as boat crew or becoming a Telecommunications Operator (TCO) should take it as well.

Show up, sign in, participate and you have completed it for this year. If you have already completed the course, then tell another member how easy it is and how they can become more involved.

Remember that you need to have completed the Introduction to Risk Management Course before taking TCT. The Risk Management course is available online.

Forty plus feet below B4IV: a "Circle of Heroes"



On Saturday July 27th Kristi Mackey, Rob Bonnem and Harvey Prior set out to make their first visit to the recently submerged Circle of Heroes monument. First, a bit of the history of this memorial.

The sinking of the Circle of Heroes statues was eagerly anticipated by the Tampa Bay diving community. These statues, arranged as a



100-foot wide ring, were finally sunk in mid-July, to a depth of 47 feet. They are located near the Veterans

Reef dive spot, which is a popular dive spot located nine miles off Clearwater Beach. The Circle of Heroes monument is the nation's first underwater dive memorial to honor veterans. It features 12 life-sized statues of soldiers from all branches of the military. The plan is for 12 more statues to be added at some point in the future (a great opportunity to make another dive!).

The three of us set out on Harvey Prior's vessel, the B4IV, for the 80-minute ride out to the monument. Kristi and I splashed first, with Harvey staying about 100 yards off (as there is no anchoring allowed in this area). We dropped down to the sand at 42 feet and started our underwater tour. The visibility was 15 feet at best, - the daily rain showers over the previous week stirred up lots of sediment. Within 30 seconds we saw the first statue. It was a sailor standing watch and very impressive. We followed a line and were able to visit and photograph a few of the figures. We viewed all twelve statues; it was really something to see!











We surfaced after a 40 plus minute dive, had a long swim to the B4IV and noted that two dive boats had now arrived on the site. I have no doubt this is going to be a very popular spot in the gulf. We changed locations to give the other boats some breathing room, got in two more dives and returned to the Circle of Heroes so Harvey could check out the monument.



It is very impressive monument and with better visibility and the remainder of the statues to be sunk in 2020, we will surely be out there again.

Retiring a Workhorse: C-130 Makes its Final Flight

U.S. Coast Guard C-130H aircraft number 1503 is seen on the deck at the Aviation Logistic Center's (ALC) Heavy Maintenance Facility.

The plane was flown in from Air Station Clearwater in Clearwater, Florida, where it had been based. The plane represents the last of the 1500 series aircraft in the Coast Guard inventory.



The gold numbering also denotes the plane as the oldest C-130 used by the Coast Guard. The plane was flown to ALC to be retired, demilitarized and eventually destroyed.

After serving more than 40 years as a flying workhorse for the U.S. Coast Guard, C-130H number 1503 made its final flight on Friday June 21st.

The 1503 represented the last of the Coast Guard's 1500 series C-130s. Commissioned in 1974, the plane was also the oldest H model in the Coast Guard's inventory of C-130s. Near the nose of the airplane the number 1503 is displayed in gold, which indicates the plane's seniority. The 1503 also was 13 hours shy of 30,000 total flight hours, Chief Josh Sandel said.

A Coast Guard crew from the Aviation Logistics Center at Base Elizabeth City flew the 1503 to ALC, where it will be retired, demilitarized and eventually destroyed. It had been based at Air Station Clearwater, in Florida.

Sandel, who is an aviation maintenance technician assigned to ALC, said the crew flew another C130H aircraft to Clearwater to swap it out for the 1503. That plane was number 1702 and was originally assigned to Air Station Kodiak in Alaska. It was flown to ALC, where it underwent a brief maintenance period, before being turned over to Air Station Clearwater.

The 1702 now assumes the distinction as the oldest C-130 in the Coast Guard fleet, Sandel said. The 1700 series are now the only H models in use by the Coast Guard, Sandel said. The remainder of the service's C130s are the more updated J models.



Future Aircrew

On July 24, 11-10's Joan Gutek, who volunteers at Airstation Clearwater, gave an airstation tour to Dennis Houghton from 11-1 who brought along his twin ten-year-old daughters.

Dennis says his daughters are very interested in the coast guard and they came dressed for the occasion by wearing their own ODU's!

They sat in the pilot's seat on both the C130 and the helicopter to have their pictures taken.

The results were one wrong color pair of pants, one incorrect shirt, and eight people had incorrect ribbon placement, either too high or too low above the shirt pocket.






